Black History Month: Interview with Dr. Adrienne Gordy

Dr. Adrienne Gordy, the school district's Technology Lead Teacher, got great resources for teachers to use during Black History Month. Manoa teachers and scholars learned about African Americans who played important roles in our country's history.


We interviewed Dr. Gordy by email to learn more about Black History Month and resources about African Americans that Manoa scholars could use during Black History Month and throughout the school year.

Q: Why is Black History Month important? Black History Month is important because it is the annual celebration of the achievements of African Americans. Too often, the contributions and sacrifices of African Americans have been overlooked or negated, but Black History Month provides an opportunity to recognize the central role of African Americans in American history.

How did you choose the books to give Manoa teachers? I primarily worked on developing resources for teachers that would give background knowledge and a historical perspective on the individuals I profiled. Once that was completed, I collaborated with both the Humanities Curriculum Coordinator and Language Arts Lead Teacher to find books that coincided with the profiles highlighted at each grade level. We tried to select books that were not only informative and interesting, but looked inviting to read.

What inspired you to do this job? From childhood I learned about the accomplishments of people of color and it fostered a sense of pride in me. As an undergraduate, I chose to go to a HBCU (Historically Black Colleges and Universities) and graduated with a degree in African American Studies so that same sense of pride was compounded. Though I grew up learning Black History many of my colleagues did not have the same experience, so they had little recourse but to teach about the same two or three historic figures. Ideally, curating this resource not only broadens teachers' knowledge and enriches their understanding of African Americans in history, but fosters a sense of pride in all learners and the belief that *greatness lies within*.

Is there anything you would like to share to the Manoa Family? "Thank you for asking for an interview. I feel very honored that you did so."








Survey says....

We surveyed Manoa scholars to find out their most and least favorite cafeteria lunches. Here are the results.


Which is your most favorite

181 responses




Science Of Sound

Manoa scholars attended the Science of Sound assembly, run by Caroline Lin. During the assembly she taught the students how sound works and how we hear it. She also was able to create entire songs using only her 5 string violin. She used looping sound boxes to make sounds that created the songs. She also included many of the students allowing them to use some of the equipment and made people feel like a part of the assembly. "It was a nice experience that showed us all that science and sound can relate to each other." said Abby, a fifth grader at Manoa.



100 Days of School

We interviewed teachers in every grade to find out:



Kindergarten

Mrs. Henry is having a blast with her amazing kindergarten class! Many fun things are happening. They recently went on a Field Trip to see the High School Orchestra. For the 100 days of school, kindergarteners made posters with 100 things on it.

In LA, children are kid writing 2 sentences: something they like and describing it. For Read-Aloud, they are reading <u>Press Here</u>, and predicting what will happen next. Each day, they bring home a book to read by themselves. In Math, kindergarteners are learning about tens, ones, and 2-digit numbers.

For Black History Month, they found out about Charlie Parker, John Coltrane, Duke Ellington, and other Jazz musicians. The children relate to this by writing how Jazz Music makes them feel.

What's going on around Manoa?

First Grade

Mrs. Doblin's first graders are enjoying working on ipads, and sharing and playing games during morning meeting. They also like keeping track on the number of teeth lost by students, and earning table tallies to win prizes.

In LA they are learning how to make inferences and are reading books about important African American figures for Black History Month. First graders are also writing responses to what they read. In Math they

are learning to measure.

Mrs. Doblin's friends are looking forward to Dr. Seuss Day and are working hard to try to earn the Silver Slippers Award..



Second Grade

Mrs. Forman was super friendly and welcomed me into her class. She reported that the kids are excited to learn cursive. Mrs. Foreman is excited for the new science unit on Matter.

In Math they are working on mentally solving math problems. In ELA, 2nd grade is in Unit 7 and doing predictions. Second graders love to read. Popular books in Mrs. Foreman's class are <u>Hey Little Ant</u>, <u>I Survived</u> book series, <u>Cat</u> Splat, and <u>Chocolate Touch</u>.

Mrs. Foreman loves teaching second grade and is especially proud of our school library. "There are books for everyone and it is free. I love it."



Third Grade

Mrs. Mazzella loves her smart 3rd graders who do something fun and exciting everyday.

In Math they are learning about division and fractions. Fact, opinion, and persuasive letters are the focus in L.A. In Science they are growing risilo plants and they are growing a lot.

For Black History Month 3rd graders have



been reading about African American historical figures. Some are famous, like Rosa Parks. Others are not that famous, but played important roles, like Jean Baptist Point Du Sable who founded Chicago, and explorers Matthew Henson and James Beckwourth.

3rd graders are looking forward to the spring concert, which they all perform in, and their field trip to the zoo.

Fourth Grade

We asked Ms.Davis what is going on in 4th grade and this is what we found out. Starting with Language Arts she told us they are working on making inferences and drawing conclusions. They are doing a lot of projects and fun activities with poetry this includes reading and writing for Dr.Seuss and Read Across America Day.

In Math 4th graders are working on fractions and improper fractions, and are using tiles and number blocks to represent fractions.

In Social Studies 4th grade scholars are focusing on Black History Month and learning about African American firsts. Scholars also did a project about the African Americans they studied. They researched the person, then they made amazing lap books all about them.





Fifth Grade

Mrs. Longosz started teaching at Manoa this year and really enjoys it. "The teachers have been very welcoming and helpful. I really enjoy teaching the fifth grade students and we have a lot of fun."

Her favorite moment of the year so far was the trip to colonial living, spending the day with my students and learning what life like during the colonial times. She is excited to go to the fifth grade picnic because word is "it's a lot of fun and there is a lot of cool activities."

In LA 5th graders are working on making inferences and using clues from the text. In writing we just started persuasive essays.
