<u>Changes to Your Family's Financial</u> <u>Situation?</u>

If you or your family's financial situation has changed significantly from what is reflected on your federal income tax return (e.g., if you've lost a job or have experienced a drop in income), you may be eligible to have your financial aid adjusted. Complete the FAFSA questions as instructed on the application (including the transfer of tax return and income information), submit your FAFSA form, then contact the school you plan to attend to discuss how your current financial situation has changed.

The College Application Process and Naviance Presentation:

This <u>virtual presentation</u> for parents/guardians and students includes a review of the application process, Naviance, and the transcript request process. This presentation is posted on the main page of the Counseling website and in the shared folder titled "Post High School Planning Class of 2021".

Directions for attending a virtual college representative visit at HHS:

- 1. You must register in Naviance to attend a virtual college-rep visit hosted during the school day, 24-hours in advance.
- 2. To register, first you must log into Naviance. Then, click on the 'Colleges' tab in the upper right corner. Scroll to the bottom of the screen where you will see 'College Visits' on the left. You may click on the school you are interested in or click the "Show more" link to view the full list of schools visiting. Select 'Register Now' for those visits you would like to attend.
- 3. To request permission to miss class to attend a virtual college-rep visit, email the teacher whose class you may need to leave early -- at least 24 hours in advance.
- 4. You may only leave class early to attend the virtual college-rep visit if your teacher grants permission. You must make up the work you missed, as directed by the teacher.
- 5. If you are present in the building the day of the virtual visit, you should report to the Counseling Office with your Chromebook to log in.
- 6. You will be emailed the URL for the online visit 15 minutes prior to the event start time; it will come from Naviance. You can also access the link in Naviance.
- 7. Login to the virtual visit. Be sure your first and last name are displayed and that you enable video/audio, if possible, so college reps can see/hear you.

<u>Tips on Researching Post High School</u> <u>Institutions Virtually:</u>

- Talk to students who attend the Post High School Institution that you are interested in.
- Contact the admissions office and ask them to help you connect with a student to ask them about their experience.
- Delve into each school's website. Explore widely those things that matter to you. Sign up to be on the mailing list for every school you're considering. This will demonstrate your interest to the college, and keep you updated on virtual happenings at the school: admissions information sessions, tours, and other programming opportunities.
- Read college-sponsored and student-sponsored newspapers.

Please remember that completion of Steps 1-8 of the Transcript Request Instructions for Post High School Applications will initiate the Official Transcript Request and the 15 school day processing time for your transcripts.

Planning ahead:

- Continue to use and familiarize yourself with Naviance to identify your interests, research careers and colleges, organize personal data, and maintain a list of prospective colleges.
- Continue to explore your post high school options by gathering information. Visit and use the Counseling website, email your Counselor, use the tools in Naviance, look at websites, and talk to friends, family and recent graduates of Haverford to gather information on careers, majors and schools.
- Attend virtual college and career events.
- Communicate virtually with schools following the recommendations listed in this communication.
- If you are interested in playing sports in college, research the <u>National College Athletic</u> <u>Association (NCAA)</u> eligibility requirements.
- If applicable, start to gather material for a portfolio (drama, music, art, sports, etc.).

Teacher Letter of Recommendation:

It is recommended that you choose ONE teacher to write you a letter of recommendation unless your school requires two. During virtual learning you should communicate with the teacher by email BEFORE you add a request in Naviance.

Reminders:

- A personal email address should be used for post high school planning. Your school district email should **not** be used.
- Refer to the <u>Senior Year Planning Checklist</u> for a timeline on tasks to accomplish senior year.
- Visit <u>National Association for College</u> <u>Admission Counseling</u> to view changes in college admission events and more as a result of COVID-19.
- Refer to <u>Common App's Application guide</u> <u>for first-time students</u> as a resource when completing the Common Application.

Counselor Letter of Recommendation:

If you will be requesting your Counselor to write a Letter of Recommendation, please complete the Post High School Planning Reflection and Activities Record 2019 in Naviance. Also, it is helpful, but optional, if your parent/guardian completes the Parent/Guardian Information Sheet in Naviance.

PSAT will now be on January 26, 2021

The PSAT is practice for the SAT and is open to 9th, 10th and 11th grade students. It also qualifies 11th grade students for the National Merit Scholarship Program. The PSAT assesses the same knowledge and skills as the SAT, providing a checkin on college readiness before taking the SAT. Registration information coming soon.

How to Get Organized:

Use a planner

Take a planner to every class. Record assignments, tests, quizzes, special events, appointments, etc.

Also use your planner to break large assignments and projects down into more manageable parts.

Have a system for organizing papers

Whether you use folders or binders, the important thing is that you have a system for organizing your all of your papers – class notes, handouts, homework, etc. Have a specific place for every paper.

Develop routines

Have a morning routine that gets your day off to a good start and a nighttime routine that includes getting everything ready for the next day.

Eliminate clutter

Throw out the things you don't need, put papers you want to keep in a home file, and keep your study area clean and neat.

How to Succeed in Class:

Be prepared

When you come to class, have all of your homework done, and bring everything you'll need with you. Be alert, well rested, and ready to learn.

Eliminate distractions

Put away anything that isn't directly related to what you are doing in that class.

Have a positive attitude

Walk into each class with a positive attitude and be determined to learn as much as you can. Remember, the more you learn in class, the less you need to learn on your own.

Participate

The best way to stay engaged in your classes is to be an active participant. Ask and answer questions, and participate in discussions.
