Choose a topic from the book and a non-fiction article about it. Compare the reality to how the facts were used in the story.	Examine and explain, citing references, the techniques the author uses to hook you into the book and keep you reading.	Using a scene from the book/story, write opposing viewpoints arguing two different sides of an issue.
Make a Venn diagram to compare and contrast yourself to the main character or two main characters from different books	Write an editorial about an issue that occurs in your book. What position would you take? Why?	Write a poem that explains the theme or main idea of your book.	Create a new ending for the story. What would you have changed?	Write a letter to a character in your book or author. Ask questions, give advice, or encourage them.
Write a book review giving the book a rating and describing why you felt that way.	Using the music of a familiar song, write new lyrics to describe your book.	Write a dialogue between a character from your last book and a character from this book. What would they discuss?	Make a test that you could give other students who read your book. Be sure to include some open-response questions.	Create a commercial for your book. What should it say to get people to come to see the movie version?
Taking one character from your book, write a short story that includes that character. It should be different from the story you read.	Extra! Extra! Write a newspaper article about an important event that happened in the story. Be sure to stick to the facts.	Vote for me! Write a campaign speech as to why the main character should be elected president (of the class, of the U.S.).	Create a scrapbook page or brochure for this adventure for your character. Be sure to include pictures and captions.	Decide on an extension of your own. Get approval from your teacher.
