Creating good study and work habits now will help you to be more successful:

As you are progressing through second semester, this may be the time to look for new ways to change your study habits and improve your grades. If you are struggling to keep up with a class or are falling behind, here are some things you can do to help improve your grades and work habits. Please remember to reach out to your teacher or counselor if you have any questions or you need some support.

- 1. Create a homework schedule and a process for reviewing what you need to complete for each class. Block out a time after school and eliminate distractions.
- 2. Find a new place to complete homework. Maybe visit the HHS Library or the Haverford Township Library after school to find a quiet place to get work done.
- 3. Develop and vary your study methods. You can review study guides, complete practice problems, create flashcards or create a guizlet.
- 4. Organize a list of what you need to accomplish each day and cross off each item as you complete it.
- 5. Attend a session in the math center or writing center for extra help. These services are offered every week and give you an opportunity to get some help in a smaller setting.

The Math Center is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:30-3:30 pm in room 337

The Writing Center is open on Wednesdays from 2:30-3:30 pm in the Library

6. Ask your teacher if you can meet with them outside of your regular class time. Some teachers will meet with students before school, after school, during homeroom or during lunch. Touch base with your teacher and see when they are available to meet.

Grade Point Average (GPA):

Grade Point Average or GPA is calculated each semester as classes are completed. Each final course letter grade is assigned a point value. The unweighted GPA is calculated by taking the credit for the class and multiplying it by the point value assigned to the letter grade. Then, add up all of the multiplied values and divide by the total number of credits.

Classes taken at the honors or AP level have a different point value (unweighted point value x 1.25 = weighted point value). Students who take honors and AP classes will have a weighted GPA that differs from the unweighted GPA. There are no points awarded to classes that are taken Pass/Fail.
